Council, community seek answers in billing flap

Group calls for resignation

The saga continues in the recent drama concerning the City of Bel Aire's over-billing of nine commercial clients for sewer service between 2003 and 2007.

On June 7, nearly 40 community members attended a city council meeting and expressed displeasure with the governing body's course of action in dealing with the over-charges. Many of those community members lined up to present and support a petition calling for the resignation of council member Betty Martine.

Martine served as city clerk during the time of the overcharges and has faced a great deal of backlash from the community ever since she chose to bring the overcharges to the attention of the council.

Still, a number of her current and former colleagues from the governing body defended her actions — calling into question former mayor James E. Dunning's involvement in the situation. Dunning denied Martine's claims that he instructed her to charge extra to commercial accounts without the council's consent but council member

Police concerned about delay in reporting

Care center conducts own probe

The investigation into a possible sex offense at Bel Aire's Catholic Care Center has been closed, but because of the situation, any further such incidents will be handled differently.

At issue is an April 24 incident at the center, 6700 E. 45th North, that Bel Aire police responded to.

According to police reports, two officers were dispatched to the center to look into a possible sex offense.

A nurse said she entered a room and found a maintenance worker "standing at the head" of a patient bed. The situation was unusual because there was no reason for the employee to be there as there was no work order for the room, the report stated. The patient was checked and nothing was found to be wrong with her, according to the report.

What was an issue from the police department's perspective is that center officials delayed calling law enforcement.

"The Catholic Care Center waited four hours to call the police to report the incidents," the report said.

The center conducted its own investigation and "compromised any possible evidence that may have been recoverable by police investigators," the report stated.

Ex-chief pleads to theft of public funds

A former Bel Aire police chief has pleaded guilty to a federal misdemeanor charge of theft of public funds, Acting U.S. Attorney Tom Beall said May 31.

John R. Daily, 63, Haysville, pleaded guilty to one count of theft of government funds. In his plea, he admitted he filed paperwork falsely representing that certain firearms

were purchased for the exclusive use of the Bel Aire Police Department. As a result, no sales tax was collected on the purchase of the firearms. Specifically:

- \$72 in sales tax was not collected on the purchase of a Sig Sauer 1911R TACOPS handgun.

- \$231 in sales tax was not collected on the purchase of three FNP90 rifles.

The U.S. Attorney's Office

said Daily knew or believed that the firearms would be owned by individuals, not by the department, although the firearms would be available for work use as well as personal use.

Sentencing is set for Aug. 17. Daily faces a penalty of up to one year in federal prison and a fine up to \$100,000.

Daily was chief of the Bel Aire Police Department from May 2006

to December 2013.

He resigned on Dec. 13, 2013, because of health issues.

He was unable to work full time for the last three months of his tenure.

"I have the upmost respect and appreciation for the community and its citizens and I've enjoyed my time," Daily said in a 2013 interview with The News. "I enjoyed every bit of it."

Guy MacDonald, among others, is skeptical.

MacDonald maintains that Dunning was Martine's direct supervisor and has extensive training in accounting. This makes it seem unlikely that Martine would be able to tamper with rates without Dunning's knowledge, although it's still possible.

The backlash from the community seems to stem from the fact that Martine admitted to the wrongdoing. Many community members now believe she should be held responsible, although most in the governing body maintain that she acted merely as an agent in the rate tampering.

On June 21, the council chambers were much less crowded following Mayor David Austin's previous proclamation that an audit was ongoing and that action would be announced based on those findings by early August at the latest.

This time, the focus from council members and community members, alike, throughout most of the meeting was on the possible motivations for those who have sided against Martine.

Council member Dr. Ramona Becker halted the approval of minutes from the June 7 meeting, expressing a desire to have the citizens' concerns portion of that meeting included verbatim. Becker was particularly concerned with community member Kristin Jones' motives for initially taking the story to the media rather than presenting her concerns to the council.

Jones wasn't present at this week's meeting, but was vocal in calling for Martine's resignation at the previous meeting. Becker and almost everyone else at this week's meeting are concerned with Sunrise Christian Academy's motives in calling for Martine's resignation and Becker made sure to point out Jones' ties to Sunrise, which was a customer that was overcharged.

"Kristin Jones does seem to have a very close tie to Sunrise," said Becker. "Some might consider her calling the media the same as if Sunrise called the media themselves. I also want to point out that the remarks made — that are left out of our minutes — said 'the media is here and we can't un-sensationalize anything.' In the minutes it doesn't state it that way and I think that's very important; she was essentially admitting there that this story had been sensationalized."

Becker also went on to express concern that Jones had consulted only one member of the council before consulting Sunrise

administrators and the media. The only council member who was not ruled out as the possible consultant was Peggy O'Donnell and Becker refrained from calling her out but did allude to the fact that O'Donnell failed to bring the matter before her colleagues if she did, in fact, speak with Jones.

O'Donnell also serves as a government teacher at Sunrise Academy, which seems to have led some to suspect her and others representing the school of ulterior motives in calling for Martine's removal. Interestingly, O'Donnell was the only council member opposed to Jones' and other concerned citizens' remarks being included verbatim in last meeting's minutes, which passed 4-1.

Dave Landoll, who strongly supported Martine at the last meeting, echoed some of Becker's concerns over O'Donnell and Sunrise. He speculated that the petition for Martine's resignation was signed mostly by members of Sunrise.

"There's another agenda here," said Landoll. "Sunrise wants to take away your vote on the city council; they want to control your city council. It's imperative that Ms. Martine continue to serve the city of Bel Aire in spite of their attempted character assassination of her. An apology is due to Ms. Martine from Sunrise for that character assassination."

Landoll went on to address O'Donnell specifically, stating that her involvement in voting on anything in regards to Sunrise is "a plain and simple conflict of interest." Landoll then suggested that perhaps O'Donnell ought to be the one to resign from the council.

Another citizen, Lyle Ackerman, also echoed the sentiment. Ackerman was concerned that a council member would meet with Jones and Sunrise administrators and "collaborate" with them to inform the media rather than bringing the information to the other council members in an executive session.

"I suspect the real reason was to set up a smoke screen," said Ackerman, "under the guise of having an issue with sewer charges in order to put pressure on Betty Martine to resign effective immediately so that someone more favorable could be appointed, as Betty Martine has been known to cast her votes in the best interest of Bel Aire, not special interest groups. So when people ask me what is going on in Bel Aire, I tell them I believe Sunrise is trying to overthrow the government."

In other business June 21, the council:

- Approved appropriations the amount of \$383,394.45.

- Listened to Dave Landoll ask for newspaper deliveries to be ticketed for "littering" newspaper deliveries in driveways and notifying thieves that people are out of town.

- Heard Gary O'Neil announce that the Lions Club will be selling fireworks from June 27 to July 4.

- Listened to Mayor David Austin's report that after budget workshops, Bel Aire is expecting no increase in spending. Austin also called for the community to have fun and use common sense on Independence Day.

- Heard Peggy O'Donnell thank community members for get well wishes following her surgery.

- Listened to City Manager Ty Lasher announce that a brush pile will be available for those who need to dispose of storm debris. Lasher also noted that the city might experience increased traffic due to garage sales.

- Approved a second addendum to real estate purchase and sale agreement with Factory Direct Copper & Granite LLC by a unanimous vote.

- Approved an ordinance authorizing the sale and disposition of certain property under a lease between the City of Bel Aire and the City of Bel Aire Public Building Commission by a unanimous vote.

- Approved a final plat for the Deer Run Addition by a unanimous vote and approved a developers agreement with 2BD LLC for the addition.

- Approved a final plat for the Rock Spring 2nd Addition to the City of Bel Aire by a unanimous vote and approved a developers agreement with A&D Properties LLC for the addition.

- Approved a government services agreement for fire code inspection by Sedgwick County Fire District No. 1 and enforcement by Sedgwick County.

- Approved vacating the building setbacks for Block B of the Central Park 4th Addition by a unanimous vote.

- Approved an existing at-grade public highway crossing agreement with Union Pacific Railroad for 37th Street by a unanimous vote.

- Approved a longitudinal pipeline agreement with the Union Pacific Railroad Company by a unanimous vote.

- Approved a resolution rescinding Resolution Nos. R-16-03 and R-16-04 regarding the advisability of issuing Taxable Industrial Revenue Bonds for Mindcure Behavior and Wellness Center by a unanimous vote and approved a resolution rescinding Resolution R-14-06 regarding the advisability of issuing Taxable Industrial Revenue Bonds for Homes Plus at Tierra Verde by a unanimous vote. Both of the prior bonds were rescinded because the respective businesses were unable to move forward due to "financial" reasons.

- Approved a proposal for a new Park Master Plan from LK Architecture/PEC for \$26,500 by a unanimous vote. Gary O'Neil urged the council to table this project until debts that might have to be paid for sewer overcharges are figured out.

- Approved a proposal for drainage studies on Lycee Heights pond and Eagle Lake from Kaw Valley Engineering for \$19,900 by a unanimous vote. This is an attempt to find solutions for stormwater drainage issues.

- Approved an individual personal guarantee from Gene Vitarelli in the amount of \$62,000 for water and streets associated with Rock Spring Phase 4 by a unanimous vote.

- All members of the council were present. There was a 20 minute executive session taken at 8:16. No action was taken.

In other business during its June 7 meeting, the council:

- Approved allowing mixed use development at the northwest corner of the intersection of 45th and Woodlawn. That will allow a strip center to be built there. However, due to the developer also wanting to put

in storage units, the design request needs to go back to the Planning Commission for another hearing.

"This action doesn't allow those units," said City Manager Ty Lasher.

If residents object to the development, they will have a chance to make those concerns known at that meeting, which is July 14. The developer, who is not being named at this time, has not yet purchased the land, as that deal will rest on what happens with the zoning. The corner involves between two and four acres, or four lots. Three of the lots are now zoned commercial and the council's action matches the fourth lot's zoning with the others. Storage units are only allowed in what is called an "overlay," which means that a new zoning allowance is placed over the permitted use. Storage units also are permitted in industrial zoning, but there's no desire to rezone the corner for that, Lasher said.

Lasher said there have been "concerns" about the storage units and if they go in there, the rules must be followed. That includes notification to nearby land owners, along with Planning Commission approval and City Council approval. Council members have let it be known that they are receptive to residents' concerns and take them into consideration concerning developments. In the past, a proposed cell phone tower in the city was voted down because of citizens' concerns.

- Approved appropriations in the amount of \$380,653.

- Listened to Marla Canfield of the Regional Economic Area Partnership speak. Canfield emphasized the importance of cooperation between different governing bodies in the area. She also stressed the importance of Southwest Airlines' service to and from Wichita and how, she said, it holds down airfares among all carriers.

- Approved a service agreement with Wichita State University for the Citizen Survey and Engagement Proposal. The council accepted the proposal at its March 13th Council meeting. This agreement formalizes the project and was reviewed by the city's attorney.

- Approved a resolution authorizing the director of finance and administration, Ted Henry, and Lasher to transfer and withdraw funds, issues letters of instructions and other actions called for with investment of funds.

Lasher explained that the city has various types of reserves that often sit in the bank that are being utilized for different projects. Some of money is in the Kansas Municipal Investment Pool, where the city gets a higher interest as well as collateralizes the money. The resolution adds Lasher and Henry to the list so there can be three people who can move money.

- Approved a bid for asphalt, curb, wheelchair ramps, thermal crack and City Hall parking lot repairs from PP&J Construction for \$40,312. One other bid was received. The 2016 street budget contains \$100,000 for street repairs and city staff has identified a number of repairs that are needed but too large for the city's public works' staff. "We have used PP&J in the past and they do terrific work, so we're very comfortable accepting their bid," Lasher said.

- Approved three zone changes, all previously approved by the Planning Commission at its May 12 meeting. They are:

- Deer Run. The developer of Deer Run is requesting a zone change from AG - Agriculture to R-4 Residential. The 60-acre addition is on the east side of Rock, south of Rock Spring and north of Sawmill Creek. "Such a zone change would be a good fit as Rock Spring is housing and connects to this development from the north," Lasher said.

- Chapel Landing Second Addition. Lasher said the developers of Chapel Landing believe an area dedicated to patio

homes would be "beneficial to the development and offer different types of housing as well as price points." They want a cul-de-sac with patio homes along Woodlawn and as a result, they are replating about nine acres into 18 smaller lots for patio homes.

Rock Spring Second Addition

The developer of Rock Spring has a contract to purchase 20 acres just east of the Rock Spring Addition and plans to develop the area into duplexes. The purchase agreement requires the zone change from agriculture "AG" to Multi Family Residential "R-5" to be approved prior to closing.

The center is a division of Ascension Health and its officials deny that there was any wrongdoing. In a statement, it said protocol was followed and it notified medical authorities, state agencies and others as mandated.

"Immediately upon learning of the alleged incident we separated and protected all involved parties, suspended the individual in question and followed protocol by notifying state regulatory agencies, medical authorities and others," said Chris Curran, vice president of communication at Ascension Health, in a prepared statement. "The patient's medical doctor was al-

ready onsite, examined her and saw nothing concerning. At the same time, the individual with durable power of attorney for the patient was informed and indicated that, based on the medical doctor's findings, the patient did not have to be transported to the hospital and examined."

Cindy LaFleur, the center's executive director, said the center now is working "side by side" with the police and chief Darrell Atteberry, who raised the concern.

"We've smoothed things out and are building working relationships with him," she said.

Catholic Care Center wants to continue to be a "great partner" with the city of Bel Aire, she said. The center has been in Bel Aire for more than 25

years, has 176 long-term and skilled beds and em-

ploys about 300 people.

Residents arrested after fire response

Two people were arrested June 15 after firefighters responded to a fire in a business and allegedly discovered marijuana plants in the attached residence east of Park City.

The Sedgwick County Sheriff's Office said the owner of Invisible Fence of Central Kansas at 6260 N. Hillside called 911 to

report a fire at the business.

After crews extinguished the blaze, they checked the residence to be sure the fire had not spread. Firefighters said they saw a marijuana-growing operation inside the residence.

Sheriff's Lt. Lin Dehning said firefighters called in the sheriff's office to investigate.

Authorities served a search warrant on the residence.

"As a result of evidence on the scene and interviews conducted" two arrests were made, Dehning said.

Breeze Kaye Bruggeman, 37, and Clark

William Tesky, 43, were arrested on charges of cultivating a controlled substance, possession of paraphernalia to cultivate a controlled substance and endangering a child.

The owner of the property leases it separately to the business and residents.

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
