Former Bel Aire man takes passion for salsa to a new level

Mike and Jennifer McCoy have started an all-natural and home grown line of food products.

So far, the McCoy's biggest hit is their Mook's salsa.

The McCoy's are former Bel Aire residents who recently moved to Kechi.

Mook's is made with real vegetables and spices and contains no preservatives. The salsa comes in three levels of spicy — mild, hot and inferno. The McCoy's said their goal was to provide a product that is healthier and more delicious than anything else on the market.

However, insuring that level of quality is no easy task.

"We had a co-packer in Kansas City that used to make it for us for three or four years," said Mike. "But it never tasted right. When I would do demos in stores and people would compliment us, I always thought 'yeah, but you should taste it when I make it.'"

The salsa (and brand)

was called "Real Deal" back then. That name was taken from a restaurant and catering company Mike started in his hometown of El Dorado. Mike and Jennifer perfected their salsa recipe while running Real Deal Café, but they may have never developed the idea if it weren't for a tragic series of events. Mike's father helped him to get his business started — but was involved in a fatal car accident about a week later.

"That (restaurant) was the last thing he gave me," said Mike. "He ended up getting in a bad car wreck before it opened. He actually passed away a day after it opened. It happened right outside the café. I was inside setting up the restaurant when I heard the wreck and I ran outside. I was in a downward spiral after that. Jennifer and I almost went our separate ways until she found out she was pregnant about a month after my father passed away."

The two continued to run Real Deal Café and had their daughter, Ashlyn. The restaurant was successful and it helped them pay the bills, but the couple admits that after 40 years of combined restaurant

experience they were getting burned out. Mike has always loved Mexican food and had already started experimenting with salsa recipes. He knew by the customer feedback at the restaurant that he had something special; but taking the next step in making that a full-time venture was a difficult decision.

"I think it was a trickle-down or domino effect that led us here," said Jennifer. "We didn't leave the restaurant with everything planned out so I think it gave him the kick in the pants he needed to get to work. His dad was attached to that restaurant with him and it was hard for him to close that chapter. Without all that happening, I honestly don't think the salsa would be where it is today."

The couple closed Real Deal Café on Oct. 1, 2016. Since then, they've dedicated a lot of resources to rebranding their product. They moved on from their original co-packer and found another who produces a quality product that is up to their standards. They had their webpage redesigned. Mike tweaked the recipes a little bit and Jennifer devel-

oped a new name and logo. They changed the name from Real Deal to Mook's. Mook is the nickname Mike's family calls him; it came from his younger sister, Lauri, being unable to say Mike when she was little.

The feedback they have gotten from their new and improved product over the last year has been positive. Mike has been working constantly to get the word out about their product. Over the last month, he has been to Sam's Clubs across the country. He will soon be travelling to Bentonville, Ark., — the home of Wal Mart — to present the product. He has also recently gotten good feedback from a national distributor out of Omaha.

The future looks bright for the product but the present success is something the McCoy's are proud of. Local support for the product has exploded. The McCoy's said they could not be more thankful to their friends and neighbors in Bel Aire and Kechi for being so supportive and telling others about their product.

The product is currently

Council seats to be decided

Last day to register to vote is Oct. 17

Bel Aire voters will head to the polls this month and next as they pick local leaders in city council races.

Election Day is Nov. 7. The last day to register to vote is Oct.

17. Advance voting in person at the Sedgwick County Election Office will begin Oct. 23. Advance voting at outlying vote centers will be Nov. 2.

Up for grabs in Bel Aire are four seats on the council and the two-year mayoral term.

Newcomers Jeff Elshoff, Justin Smith, Jim Benage and Jeff Hawes are seeking council seats. Michael O'Donnell will be on the ballot, but is not actively seeking a seat.

Running to retain their seats are Ramona Becker, Diane Wynn and Guy MacDonald.

Wynn was appointed to the council in 2015. Becker and MacDonald were elected to four-year terms in 2013.

Peggy O'Donnell did not file for re-election.

Voters will cast votes for four candidates.

David C. Austin and Patty Beamer are mayor candidates. Austin is seeking a third two-year term. Beamer told The Breeze that she is not actively seeking the seat because of a "change in life."

Two "meet the candidates" nights have been scheduled.

The first, sponsored by the Bel Aire Chamber of Commerce, will be 7 p.m. Oct. 26 in the community room of City Hall.

The second is sponsored by the Bel Aire Seniors Club. It will be 7 p.m. Oct. 30 at the Bel Aire Recreation Center, 5251 E. 48th North.

Bel Aire lowers some utility fees

The hottest topic at the Sept. 19 Bel Aire City Council meeting was whether to lower utility reconnection fees and late charges. Each council member had a differing opinion.

The city had a reconnection fee of \$150, which is higher than other cities in the area. The city was also charging 10 percent for late fees. City Manager Ty Lasher said those fees were established at least 20 years ago. He said the situation was recently brought to the city's attention by a resident who had been disconnected. That resident brought the issue to the Utility Advisory Committee, which looked at what other cities in the area charge and made recommendations to the council to lower the charges.

Some members of the council did not want to lower the charges as recommended by the Utility Advisory Committee.

Council president Betty Martine prepared a list of things she thought the money could potentially help the city pay for. She said lowering these fees would cost the city between \$50,000 and \$65,000 per year. Some of the things she said the money could be used for included Chisholm Creek Utility Authority fees and water and sewer line repairs.

"As long as I'm on the council I won't vote for a water or sewer (charge) increase," said Martine. "That money could also be sent to Wichita when they raise rates. We haven't raised our rates on customers because of Wichita raising their rates (on the city) for quite some time. If we have to raise taxes in the future to pay for this, I won't vote for that."

Council member Guy MacDonald also felt that lowering these charges was unwise. He said the move would affect the city's operating budget too

drastically.

"The city has often had difficulty raising funds for its various projects," said MacDonald. "For a council to reduce the amount of money that the city receives — and has received for a number of years — I think, is the wrong course of action to take. Reducing the amount of money that the city has is something I cannot approve. I believe that money could be used elsewhere."

Other members of the council thought the move was appropriate. Council members such as Peggy O'Donnell acknowledged that this move might mean the city will have to start raising water and sewer rates in the future.

"Unfortunately, if Wichita raises their water rates we would have to pass that on to the consumer," said O'Donnell. "None of us want a water increase. I don't want any kind of tax increase. The bottom line

is, if they do, I would rather the people who consume it pay our small increase rather than to make a hardship even worse on people. I appreciate the work the Utility Advisory Committee did and I think this is more in line with what other cities are doing."

Council member Ramona Becker agreed with O'Donnell. She said the current fee system is unfair to residents who are already struggling with utility bills.

"Bel Aire is way off line with what other cities are paying for these shutoffs," said Becker. "I don't like to see the burden being put on the backs of those who are least able to pay. Those struggling with their utility bills should not be paying an exorbitant fee. We should not depend on income from people who are least able to pay. In my opinion, it's not an ethical thing to do to our citizens."

The fees were lowered with

a 3-2 vote. Reconnection fees will go from \$150 to \$50. Late charges will also be lowered from 10 to 5 percent. Lasher encouraged anyone who is having problems paying their bills to communicate their issues to the city so it can work with residents to resolve those situations.

In other business during the Sept. 19 meeting, the council:

- Recognized Linda Scott for her years of service on the CDAC.

- Approved special assessment actions for sewer, water and paving in the Courtyards at Elk Creek phase two; paving, sewer, storm water and water in phase one of Chapel Landing; sewer extension for Sunflower Commerce Park; paving and water in Catholic Life Center, third addition; storm water, sewer and water in Lycee Heights, second addition with a unanimous vote.

- Approved internal improvements to the sanitary sewer and water distribution systems in Lycee Heights, second addition with a unanimous vote.

- Approved water distribution system, paving, sanitary sewer and storm water drainage improvements for Chapel Landing, third addition with unanimous votes.

sold at Leeker's in Valley Center and Park City, as well as Whole Foods. The McCoys also regularly demo their products at local Sam's Clubs, especially at the K-96 and Rock loca-

tion. Hyvee in Kansas City sells the product in all of its stores and there are several locally owned stores across Kansas that carry Mook's. Wichita State University recently made Mook's its official salsa and now serves it in their cafeteria and sells it in their store. Products can also be purchased on Amazon or mooksfoods.com. They currently sell taco and meat seasonings that are all natural spices and contain no preservatives. They're also in the process of developing a fajita seasoning.

The McCoys said they would love for their products to be sold nationwide, but the most important thing to them in the short

term is to keep Mook's a family business. They said they regularly get asked if they have tried to get on the television show, Shark Tank, but that's not the direction they want to go.

"We're doing it on our own," said Jennifer. "We want to keep our business and we want to have our story with it. We want to

be able to control the quality of our product — but more than anything it's something we're leaving for our kids. At the end of the day, we're doing this for them.
