Council agrees to terms with Elk Creek

Creating the final plat for Elk Creek's second addition has been a long process, but on July 17 the Bel Aire City Council unanimously approved a memorandum of understanding with the Elk Creek Homeowners Association. The council also unanimously approved the

final plat. The city attempted to pass the final plat on April 17, but concerned citizens spoke against its approval.

The original developer of Elk Creek went bankrupt in 2009 and the bank took ownership of all the lots. The bank then found another developer that agreed to buy all but nine of the lots. Those nine lots had

flood-plain issues and were given to the city's land bank, making the city responsible for the special assessments and homeowners' dues. Those fees are costing the city about \$30,000 per year.

The city hired MKEC for \$38,500 in January to handle the re-platting of the nine lots in an attempt to resolve flood-

plain issues so they can be sold. Jason Gish of MKEC explained that by creating a dedicated drainage easement, the lots can be split between parcels that can and cannot be built upon.

"When FEMA reset the flood-plain maps, it put flood plains back onto these lots," said Gish. "In order to alleviate a situation where somebody

would go buy a lot and they can't get a mortgage because they'd have to get flood-plain insurance, what we're doing for the city is creating a lot that splits the lots in two. Creating a drainage easement is a way to protect the drainage way and restrict what happens there. But

Celebrity chef gives area restaurant a makeover

Greg and Pamela Buss love what they're doing at Fetch Bistro, but the restaurant had trouble getting started.

Opened in 2017, the business explored a new concept in the world of Kansas cuisine — serving meals to dogs along with their owners.

Greg said that for whatever reason, the restaurant just wasn't taking off the way they'd hoped.

Later in 2017, they got an offer that no restaur-

ant owner could refuse. World-renowned chef, Gordon Ramsay was considering giving Fetch Bistro a makeover. The offer came as part of Ramsay's newest television series, Fox's "24 Hours to Hell and Back." In the show, Ramsay and his production crew perform restaurant transformations over a period of 24 hours.

In early 2018, Greg and Pamela received word that an "expert" would be coming to scout their location. They said they had no idea what would happen next.

"When Ramsay got here, he was in disguise," said Pamela. "We weren't sure he was coming and we didn't recognize him

when he came in. They even told us up until the show that the expert could come in and say no if they don't like it. They told us

we were one of two being considered in the area and they were setting up as if

Bel Aire preps for Woodlawn expansion

City chooses engineer

The Bel Aire City Council selected an engineering firm July 17 to oversee the Woodlawn expansion project.

The city received a grant from WAMPO to expand Woodlawn from 37th North to 45th North, which includes the intersection at 45th and Woodlawn. Funding and construction are set to take place in 2020. However, the city first needed to hire an engineer to design the project and engage the public.

KDOT has specifications that must be followed by the city in order to obtain funding. A selection committee made up of city officials must judge the qualifications of engineering firms and choose a company for final approval. Mayor David Austin said the selection committee had to make a tough decision between two or three strong candidates, but ultimately recommended MKEC. On July 17, the council unanimously approved MKEC for the project.

Council member Jim Benage has been passionate about the project since he began campaigning for a seat on the council. He is excited about what it could mean for the city, but also said the project needs to be done the right way.

"This is a gateway to Bel Aire and we need to do it right," said Benage. "We can have more economic impact on the city — if we do this right — than probably any other project we're thinking about."

Benage agreed that the selection committee

Council member Jeff Elshoff was absent. There was a 30 minute executive session taken to discuss the Elk Creek second addition final plat and no binding action was taken.

man "has a lot to lose. Let's take it from him." The protestor also posted photos of the man and his 4-week-old son. The man took the posts as a threat and a call to action to other protestors. No arrests have been made.

it allows the billable portion of the lot to receive a mortgage without the encumbrance of flood insurance."

The backs of the lots, like others in Elk Creek, will be up against the wetland area in the neighborhood. One big concern residents who attended the meeting had was whether those wetlands will be protected while more homes are built against them. Gish said the non-buildable portions of the lots that are against those wetlands will ensure that they are

protected; he said that some of the properties will simply have different or more interesting backyards.

However, splitting the lots into buildable and unbuildable segments does present some challenges. The Elk Creek HOA currently requires a 1,700-square-foot minimum on one level of the home. Because these lots will have less buildable land, the new properties are being proposed at a minimum of 1,170 square feet by the city. City Manager Ty Lasher said the city wants to integrate these properties into the Elk Creek HOA, but that would be later on and wouldn't hold the nine lots to the HOA's minimum square footage requirements.

That idea was a cause of more concern for current Elk Creek residents on April 17. Each resident who spoke asked the council to table the item to allow current residents more time to give feedback. In addition to being worried about

the preservation of the wetlands, the residents were worried about the uniformity in Elk Creek and compliance with the HOA's standards. One resident said adding the lots to the HOA after letting them skip out on the guidelines felt like "a slight of hand."

However, the council listened to the concerns of the residents. Each council member expressed the opinion that the city needed to move the lots, but that giving residents time to look at the facts and express their opinions was also clearly important. They unanimously agreed to table the items.

"The only thing that really concerns me at this point is the minimum square footage and understanding how that's going to work with the HOA," said council member Justin Smith. "So moving forward, I would want to adjust the minimum square footage. I think the 1,500-square-foot recommendation is a good one, but my concern with moving forward with

that is we haven't talked to the HOA, which would be required to incorporate this at a later date. But doing nothing with these lots is not an option for us. We can't continue to pay \$30,000 a year maintaining them."

The city did make an offer to give these lots and special assessments to the HOA, but it declined. The council unanimously voted to table both items related to this re-platting on April 17. However, the council was ready to move on the issue on July 17.

Mayor David Austin said he was pleased with the decision-making process.

"The business of governing is not easy, and it's not something that any of us take lightly," said Austin. "When all of us ran, we knew that there would be decisions that people just weren't going to like, and those people are our friends and our neighbors. These are hard decisions and some of them have downsides. ... Most of us have tried to act in

good faith throughout this process; and I'm happy to report that I think we're at an understanding."

Lasher said the council agreed to include the nine lots in question in the Elk Creek HOA, meaning they will have to follow all the same specifications as the other homes in Elk Creek. The HOA was also given final review of all designs. The one aspect of the design that was still holding up the process as of late July was the potential re-zoning the nine lots that the

city still hoped to keep.

That re-zoning would allow for some smaller lot lines and square footage requirements, but the HOA refused to negotiate its covenants with the city. The council ultimately agreed to have the lots zoned the same as the others in Elk Creek. It seems the city has now met all of the HOA's requirements for the lots. Lasher said he expects the HOA to accept the terms, and they have until Aug. 1 to officially do that.

DID YOU KNOW?

All Bel Aire residents are required to pay a \$4.06 per month recycling fee, whether or not the residents recycles. Waste Connections provides a 95 gallon cart for recyclables that they will empty every two weeks. Recycling is "single stream," which means you do not have to sort recyclables. However, not everything is recyclable.

What you can recycle with Waste Connections are aluminum cans and clean foil, chip board and cardboard (please flatten), all glass containers, junk mail, magazines, newspaper, light colored papers, phone books, steel cans, and plastic containers from #1 through #7 (# stamped on container).

What you cannot recycle with Waste Connections is any plastic bag, styrofoam, electronics, ceramics and dishes, motor oil containers, hazardous waste, yard waste, shredded paper, light bulbs, window glass, and mirrors.

BEL AIRE POLICE REPORTS

ours was going to happen. It was a lot of pressure.”

The crew came in and arranged hidden cameras while members of the staff were being interviewed. Ramsay then used the footage to show Greg, Pamela and their staff what he thought was wrong with their restaurant. If you’ve ever seen Ramsay’s shows and compared them to Fetch Bistro’s episode on July 25, you probably recognized that their episode wasn’t quite the horror show others have turned into.

The episode showed some issues that Ramsay wasn’t fond of, but he has seemed more pessimistic about plenty of other restaurants in the past. Ramsay helped with some pointers on sanitation techniques, and the restaurant now has a section without pets for those who wish to dine in a canine-free area.

Another concern of Ramsay’s was the menu. He saw the menu as being far too big and complicated; staff also admitted that the large menu caused inconsistencies in the recipes.

“We were already trying to cross-purpose food items, but our menu was still too big,” said Pamela. “There was a lot of cutting back we needed to do. We went from 65 items to about 20 to 25. And there’s a lot you can do with that. There’s a lot less waste and a lot more consistency.”

Greg said he felt Ramsay’s crew put a large amount of effort into research. He believes that’s part of the reason why the results of the transformation have been so successful.

“They did a lot of research,” said Greg. “What would work in Los Angeles wouldn’t necessarily work in Wichita. I think they were in town for three weeks or so. A lot of that was research

over the area, everything from price points to what types of food. I really felt like it wasn’t just a hit-or-miss thing; they put in a lot of work to ensure that it’s successful.”

Greg said Ramsay spent time training the staff on the new menu and said he could tell that Ramsay’s favorite part of the job is working with chefs. The couple was also impressed with the show’s tireless production crew. They said the crew of roughly 200 showed up in seven semi-trucks and legitimately executed the transformation of the restaurant in 24 hours.

In that 24-hour span, the team re-worked the menu and taught the kitchen staff how to execute it. They completely re-renovated the restaurant and added new paint, new furniture, a photo booth, a new logo and a new point of sale system. They even turned the bocce ball court outside the patio into a dog park that complements the

restaurant.

“The crew was everywhere, even on the roof and in the parking lot,” said Pam. “It was chaotic but they were seamless. Everybody knew their job and they’re on their toes kind of like he is. There’s no arguing; they just get it done. They were awesome and everybody was just fantastic to work with. They kept telling us that they loved doing this episode because they loved the dogs and the concept.”

Ramsay was hard on the couple at times and challenged them during filming, but the couple sensed that Ramsay felt Greg and Pamela were sincere and receptive. Greg said Ramsay isn’t as harsh as he seems on television.

“Pam was definitely his favorite and I wasn’t,” said Greg. “But he was really awesome. He’s very direct and to the point; but I didn’t feel like he was a jerk like some people think from seeing him on

TV. He just knows what works and doesn’t understand why people aren’t doing it.”

At times, the show portrayed some of the stress Greg and Pamela were going through trying to make their business work before the makeover. Pamela said she has a whole new level of empathy for other restaurant owners who go through the experience.

“It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience,” said Pamela. “It was just phenomenal and Gordon was wonderful. But now

it makes it kind of hard to watch those shows because we know what they are going through and it isn’t easy.”
