## Bel Aire seventh safest city in state

SafeWise recently named Bel Aire the seventh safest city in Kansas for 2018. SafeWise is a professional review and comparison website that focuses on safety and security.

“We’ve consistently ranked in the top 10 for years,” said City Manager Ty Lasher. “I hope that’s something our citizens can feel proud of. Bel Aire is one of the safest cities in Kansas.”

SafeWise works with security

companies and also collects FBI crime statistics to come up with their lists. Bel Aire is on the list of cities with populations over 2,500.

To compile the list, SafeWise analysts reviewed 2016 FBI crime statistics and population

data and based its evaluation on the number of reported violent crimes (aggravated assault, murder, rape, and robbery) in each city per 1,000 people. If there was a tie, analysts also factored in the number of property crimes (burglary, arson, larceny-theft

and car theft).

Bel Aire’s score for violent crimes per 1,000 was 0.79. In front of Bel Aire were Mission Hills (0.00), Hesston (0.00), Prairie Village (0.50), Fairway (0.50), Goddard (0.63) and Ulysses (0.63).

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## City and Elk Creek come to terms

The Bel Aire Council on Dec. 4 unanimously approved the re-zoning of the Elk Creek second addition. The nine lots sit against the wetlands in Elk Creek.

In April, the council considered approving the re-platting of the lots, but tabled the item when concerned residents attended the meeting and asked them to take another look. Many were concerned with the protection of the wetlands as well as potentially allowing for smaller minimum square footage for buildings on the lots. The suggested zoning at the time was not in compliance with the homeowners association.

The zoning was changed from R-5b to R-3 like the rest of Elk Creek. It also allows for six-foot side-yard setbacks and zoning lot amendments.

“The purpose of this change is to maintain consistency with the surrounding neighborhood,” said council member Jeff Elshoff. “That’s something we strive to maintain here. I think that’s really important and it’s a good move.”

# Council approves plan for senior housing complex

The Bel Aire City Council Dec. 11 unanimously approved a planned unit development and zoning overlay agreement for the Villas at Prestwick. The action relates directly to the recently approved Homestead senior

housing facility. Homestead offers affordable housing for seniors with energy efficient appliances and low bills. It builds duplexes and triplexes that are typically about 1,100 square feet.

However, the developers came to the city asking for flexibility on the minimum

square footage requirement of 1,200. They intend to build and rent units close to that size, but some of their clients won't need housing that big because many are widowed seniors. All of the units could end up being 1,100 square feet, but the developers wanted some

flexibility for their clients and asked for the square footage to be dropped to 900.

The planning commission meeting regarding the issue didn't draw much interest, but one Elk Creek resident expressed concerns. The resident did

not want to look across the pond at smaller buildings and was unsupportive of the city allowing a reduction for minimum square footage.

The compromise the city came up with was to allow only the innermost of the 12 lots to potentially allow

1,000-square-foot dwellings. The outer buildings must be at least 1,100. Since the buildings will be duplexes and triplexes, the buildings will look much larger in the end; each individual unit must meet the minimum square footage requirements.

# Bel Aire council OKs farm leases

On Dec. 18, the Bel Aire City Council approved a yearly agreement for farm leases.

A large portion of undeveloped land in Sunflower

Commerce Park is utilized for agriculture purposes. The Bel Aire Public Building Commission owns the land and leases it to the city.

The deal is a win-win for the city. The land is

well maintained by the farmers using it and the city collects over \$33,000 per year by allowing them to use it.

Mike Bohannon and Harris Entz have farmed various parcels of the

property for about 15 years. Mayor David Austin said they pay on time and have been easy to work with. Austin said the farm leases are approved on an annual basis by the city in hopes that a commercial

developer will purchase and develop the land.

In other business, the council:

- Announced the winners of the Making Bel Aire Bright Christmas light competition.

- Recognized outgoing Sedgwick County Commissioner

Dave Unruh.

- Heard a presentation from WAMPO's Mike Tan.

- Unanimously approved an R-PUD zoning overlay agreement concerning the Villas at Prestwick.

All members of the council were present. There was no executive session.

### Police probe involves vape

Bel Aire police are investigating the possible illegal distribution of e-vape cartridges containing THC at Northeast Magnet High School.

On Nov. 27, a Bel Aire police officer spoke with a vice principal of Northeast Magnet in the 5500 block of North Lycee about a drug offense. While following up on previous drug incidents, Officer Virginia Crice obtained names of several students who may be involved in distributing drugs in the school.

One student was selling the e-vape cartridges that contained THC oil to other students. THC is the active substance in marijuana that creates the high. The cartridges were the same brand as those removed from several students the week before this incident.

Crice said in a report that the student admitted to supplying the cartridges to several other students. An administrator also questioned another student who had a vape pen with three empty cannabis oil cartridges. A third student had three empty Juul cannabis cartridges, mace and multiple over-the-counter medications. Other students were also involved. All students were searched by school staff, and the items were located by school staff.

The investigation is ongoing.

### Three hurt, one arrested

Three people were sent to the hospital and one person was arrested on a DUI charge after a two-vehicle wreck Dec. 21 in the 6800 block of North Oliver in Kechi.

The Sedgwick County Sheriff's Office said Felicia R. Downing was traveling north on Oliver when a vehicle driven by Timothy Dukes struck Downing's vehicle from behind, causing it to run off the road into a ditch. Dukes' vehicle overturned and went into a ditch as well.

Downing and a passenger in her vehicle were taken to Wesley Medical Center with minor injuries.

Dukes was taken to Wesley with serious injuries. Dukes was later arrested on charges of DUI and driving with a suspended license.

### 3 wrecks in one afternoon

No one was seriously hurt in three wrecks within three hours of each other Dec. 7 in north Sedgwick County. Two of the wrecks may have involved alcohol.

Law enforcement reported a pair of single-vehicle wrecks, while two vehicles collided at

the intersection of 93rd and Meridian after class let out at nearby Valley Center High School.

The first wreck happened about 2:45 p.m. in the 10500 block of North Ridge. The Sedgwick County Sheriff's Office said a vehicle driven by Laurie Potter left the road and overturned in a field. Dispatchers said Potter was trapped inside the vehicle.

Potter was not hurt. She was arrested on a charge of DUI.

Minutes later, Valley Center police and fire crews responded to 93rd and Meridian, where two vehicles collided at the intersection.

Police said a truck driven by Justin McDonald of Valley Center was northbound on Meridian and a four-door vehicle driven by Lauren Akers of Valley Center was westbound on 93rd. Akers' vehicle crossed Meridian and was hit by the truck. Meridian traffic is not required to stop at the intersection. Akers was cited for inattentive driving, no proof of insurance and no driver's license.

Valley Center High School Principal Jamie Lewis helped direct traffic around the wreck before police officers arrived.

No injuries were reported.

The third wreck happened about 5:30 p.m. A vehicle driven by Jose Galan of Wichita was traveling south on Hydraulic when it left the road, entered a field and struck two fences near 85th North. Galan suffered minor injuries. He was arrested on a charge of DUI.

With 2018 in the rear-view mirror, the cities that call north Sedgwick County home can look at new opportunities and challenges in a new year.

There have been many accomplishments during the past 12 months.

Bel Aire continues to reach milestones with land sales.

Park City has had record-like growth in new commercial and industrial construction.

Kechi has rallied around an arts and entertainment theme for its community, creating a new city emblem and logo.

Valley Center opened its first brand-new public facility in years with great fanfare. The Community Center & Library building is an attractive and useful source of great pride for residents.

These are just a few of the accomplishments.

Now, we look ahead.

There's no surprise that the biggest need in Bel Aire heading into 2019 is commercial development.

Diversifying the city's tax base by varying the use of the city's land is a challenge. Mayor David Austin has talked about spurring development by building a Master Park to make the community more attractive to developers. It would be nice to see the governing body agree on a way forward for the Master Park Plan. Decisions have to be made. If that isn't the answer, then what is?

Valley Center has some obvious challenges. Chief among them is the East Fifth Street reconstruction project, which was supposed to be done by now. We know we'll appreciate the road when it's finished. Beyond that, the project should serve as a catalyst to study the process of road construction projects and how to make it better. The city has seen repeated problems on multiple projects.

The biggest need for Kechi in 2019 is the continued effort towards an arts and business district near the intersection of Oliver and Kechi Road. Residents have made it clear this is something they want the city to invest in and develop. The city has hit a few snags since starting the process, but seems to be fully committed to its future development. It won't happen overnight, but the most important thing for Kechi in 2019 is to stay focused and committed.

Arguably the biggest need for Park City in 2019 is developing a community identity outside of its strong business acumen. Park City has done a good job at diversifying its tax base and consistently bringing businesses to the city. Now is the time to focus on the lighter side of things. Community gatherings can make residents feel more at home, together and proud to live in their city. Community events and resident involvement is important and Mayor Ray Mann seems to recognize that. He has put an emphasis on improving the city's parks for such possible future events, which is a welcome first step.

# Bel Aire approves concrete street

On Dec. 4, the Bel Aire City Council approved a bid from Mies Construction for paving and storm water improvements for the Villas at Prestwick northwest of 45th and Rock.

The engineer's estimate for the job was \$424,717 and the city took bids for both asphalt

and concrete. The lowest bid for asphalt came from Kansas Paving in the amount of \$333,588.50 and the low bid for concrete was from Mies Construction for \$382,992.75.

Concrete has a life expectancy of 40 to 60 years, whereas asphalt is only expected to last 15 to 30 years. Asphalt needs to be sealed every five to seven years to keep

the oil from evaporating. Concrete also requires less maintenance than asphalt and city engineer Anne Stephens noted that city crews are already having a difficult time maintaining the large number of asphalt roads in the city.

Council member Jim Benage voted against the motion made to accept Mies' concrete bid. He

stated that the road will almost certainly need to be cut for utility maintenance at some point during its life. Benage said he believes concrete is more problematic to repair after the road has been cut and he was concerned about the bump such a project would leave in the road. Stephens said the process for cutting asphalt and

concrete are the same and that the results of cutting and repairing them are similar.

Stephens said asphalt plants close for the winter but there is a possibility that concrete can be put down during the winter. First, utility work in the area must be completed. The work will begin sometime in early 2019.

In other business, the council:

- Unanimously voted to re-classify nine lots in Elk Creek's second addition from R-5b to R-3 with a neighborhood overlay allowing six foot side yard setbacks.

- Unanimously approved a conditional use contingent on a 60-day planning commission review. The item is for an LED message sign at Gospel Assembly Church.

- Recognized Gary and Jackie O'Neal with the Mayor's Star Award.

All members of the council were present. No executive session was taken.
