## City OKs prominent new entry sign

There will soon be a new welcome mat at Bel Aire's front door.

The Bel Aire City Council approved a quote of \$7,200 from Tobin Rupe for what is called an "entry monument" to be installed at the northwest corner of 37th North and Woodlawn. That's in front of the Chisholm Trail State Bank.

There may be more such monuments, too. The current entry signs show the city's seal and are made of wood, but the

material is rotting.

"We knew we had to do something," said city administrator Ty Lasher said.

The city involved residents in the decision-making process on a new concept, and a design that states people are entering the "City of Bel Aire, Established 1980," along with the city's seal, was selected.

This sign won't be in any danger of rotting as it's being built for the ages. It will be five feet high by eight feet long,

## Mayor's race draws challenger, incumbent

Six candidates seek two seats on city council

David Austin wants to be mayor of Bel Aire again.

Austin has filed as a candidate for re-election to a second two-year term. He will face challenger Andrew Uhlschmidt.

"Looking back over the past two years, I am most proud of the fact we lowered taxes a bit last year and then maintained it this year," Austin said. "While doing so, we were able to make some much-needed capital improvements and investments in economic development and make a major debt payment ahead of schedule, too."

Also up for election are two at-large council seats held by Ken Lee and Betty Martine.

Martine and Lee have filed for re-election and will face challenges from Jeanette L.R. Clement, Michael Gordon, Jeff Oldenettel and Stephen Scholtz.

The general election will be April 7.

## Grocery delivery service expanding into Bel Aire

A home food delivery service expanding into northeast Sedgwick County is looking for new "customers."

Organizers of the free Roving Pantry program, which is offered through Senior Services of Wichita, are seeking home-bound Bel Aire residents age 60 and older who could benefit from the service.

"We know the need is out there," said Opal Smith, program coordinator. "In the past, we really haven't had the funds to expand. Now, we can see that we can do it to the close surrounding communities."

they get older and they have been used to doing stuff on their own," said Jack Ham-

ilton, who delivers for Roving Pantry. "... We try and make it as pleasant and friendly as possible."

Smith said the process to get started is quick and easy.

Anyone interested in the program is asked to call Smith at Senior Services (267-4378) and go through a short interview to determine eligibility.

"If you're 60 or older and can't get out and do your own shopping, you qualify," Smith said. "It's that simple. The program is not based on income. It's based solely on need."

Smith said the program is currently targeting Bel Aire because one of its two Thursday delivery routes reaches the 3400 block of North Woodlawn.

Customers pay for the food and other items they order, but there is no charge for delivery.

"I can understand some of the frustration that people have when

## Bel Aire expands use of cop cameras

Lions Club helps with funds

The Bel Aire Police Department has been able to add two more body cameras for its officers due to a gift from the Bel Aire Lions Club. The club raised the money for the \$600 cameras from a variety of community fundraisers and made a special presentation to Police Chief Darrell Atteberry during the Jan. 6 city council meeting.

City officials were pleased about the additional cameras, and said they would be useful for both the police and citizens.

"The cameras are invaluable," said Mayor David Austin. "Now there's proof and accountability."

Sometimes a dispute between a citizen and police gets into a "he said" "she said" scenario, but the cameras, which have audio and can operate in low light conditions, will resolve that, he added.

The city obtained three of the cameras in October and they've already proven useful, Atteberry said, as a citizen lodged a complaint against the department and the conduct of an officer — who had a camera in use.

"The allegations made were false and the camera proved that," he said. "He showed professionalism and we have it on record."

## New county chairman: No more business as usual

Expect some changes with Sedgwick County government this year.

Richard Ranzau, who was re-elected in November to a second four-year term as county commissioner, was selected last month to be chairman of the board of county commissioners.

"It is an increase in responsibility," said Ranzau, who represents the northwest part of the

county, including Valley Center. "But I'm looking forward to it."

Ranzau's selection represented a shift toward a more conservative majority on the commission. Karl Peterjohn, also a conservative, was selected chair pro tem. Both will serve their new roles through January 2016.

"We are going to take an aggressive look at county spending and see what we can do to improve our long-term out-

look," Ranzau said.

The county needs to reduce its overall debt, Ranzau said.

"That means we have to limit the expansion of county government in the future and look at existing spending to see if we can eliminate things we don't need," he said. "... Sometimes we do things just because it's always been done that way, when that may not be the best use of the dollar."

Ranzau said changes won't

happen overnight.

"It will take some forethought," he said.

Ranzau said it was difficult to get his ideas on the county commission's agenda during the past four years. Many discussion items were generated by staff, instead of commissioners, he said.

Changing that, a meeting agenda this month included the rollback of planning and zoning application fees, which

were recently increased by 15 percent, a move that hurt small companies, Ranzau said.

"We're going to reverse that," he said.

Ranzau said there are plenty of worthy projects that deserve funding.

However, "we can't afford all the good ideas," he said. "We're going to try to weed out the bad ideas so we can make room for some of the good ideas."



**Mayor's corner**

I love this city! That is what I said Jan. 6 as we began the new year with the second annual state of the city address. When I ran for the office of mayor nearly two years ago, I said over and over, the main job of the mayor is to be a cheerleader, promoting the city and its many opportunities. There is a lot more to it than that, but that is the fun part.

Last year was the best year to date in regards to land sales and growth. We made nearly \$1 million in additional principal debt payment. That is above and beyond the budgeted payments. In addition to making a major dent in our debt, we were able to make many improvements to our city and added fun-filled events — all at a zero mill increase.

Fifth-nine new housing units were constructed in 2014 for a value of more than \$10 million. New businesses also opened in Bel Aire, including Next Level Hoops Academy, Wholesale Fireworks and event center in old Porter Paints building, Marco's Pizza, Concierge Surgical Recovery Center, and Dr. Tim Wolff and the Rock Ridge Family Medical Practice. This translates to a total of \$22.5 million in commercial construction value for 2014.


And 2015 looks to be even better. More individuals and families will call Bel Aire home. Broadstone Villas will be open for tenants in February, Chapel Landing Phase 1 with 60 home lots will be completed, Shepard's Crossing will start Phase 3, Lycee Heights with 20 more lots will be ready for home construction and a new model home is already under construction in Central Park and more builders are showing interest in returning.

In the Sunflower Commerce Park, a closing on another lot sale is already on the calendar for February, Fed Ex and Buzzi construction will be completed and 80 acres on the east side of Greenwch will close. These are sales and openings already scheduled for this new year.

What else can we look forward to in 2015? In addition to the street repairs, installation of bike racks and entry monument signs and community events, your city council will continue to look long and hard at every opportunity to pay down land debt, but with a mind on what we want the city to look like, a master plan if you will. We will also continue to look at any available avenue to save money. At the same time, we will continue to make our city attractive and invest in economic development, so the budget can continue to improve.

The job of mayor is not one I take lightly. Your mayor is tasked with presiding at all meetings of the city council, recommending council action relating to all business of the city, including all matters of policy, all fiscal and budgetary decisions, economic development, utility management, infrastructure development and maintenance, and legal concerns and casting a vote when the council is equally divided. Additionally, your mayor: signs all non-appropriation ordinances and resolutions passed by the council, veto if/when determined appropriate, represents the city governing body at all official city functions and is the official representative of the governing body at all meetings, conferences and negotiations relating to policy matters involving other governmental units including land sales and negotiations on the Chisholm Creek Utility Authority.

I thank you for giving me the honor to do these things and I ask you to join me in celebrating your city and all our accomplishments and I hope you'll join me in looking forward to even greater things in the next 11 months.

The cameras can be attached in a number of different ways to an officer's uniform and see what the officer views, Attebery said. The department also has dash cams, but those cameras, installed in vehicles, are limited in their perspective.

Bel Aire joins a nationwide trend of cities that are employing body cameras as part of standard police gear. Officials say the video will not only help in complaints, but in possible lawsuits, too.

While officers can control when they are on or off, the

cameras also have the ability to back record up to one minute so that when a camera is switched on, the previous 60 seconds also is preserved on video.

In other action, the council:
 

- Listened to a State of the City address by Austin before the formal city meeting. Austin's 25-minute address attracted a full house of spectators, including Wichita Mayor Carl Brewer. Austin reviewed the past year for the city and laid out plans for the coming years.

"We have come so far from the very tough and dark time financially a few years back that it seems like a lifetime ago," Austin said in his speech. "So much has been accomplished in 2014. Each day, we strive to be the best Bel Aire we can be, and our rankings prove this."

Those rankings include being named the No. 1 safest small town in Kansas by Movoto Real Estate. Aus-

tin also took pride in the fact that the 2015 budget had a zero mill increase and that the city was able to make land payments ahead of schedule and include money for capital equipment.

"Continue to have faith in our city," he urged his speech's observers.

After the speech, he said that the city is going to focus on growth and that the "future looks bright."

•Approved, after some discussion, a change order with Kansas Paving to fix cracked sidewalks in the Tierra Verde Phase 1 project, near 47th North and Webb Road. The vote was 4-1, with council member Betty Martine voting against it.

The situation arose after sidewalk panels were broken by heavy utility trucks. However, it's not known whose vehicles caused the damage. Martine objected to the city taking on all of the cost and said the property owner needs to shoulder some of it, too.

Member Ramona Becker asked if it were possible to get the utility compa-

nies to pay, but member Ken Lee said that would be a difficult undertaking. "You're wasting your time trying that," he said.

•Approved a change order with Kansas Paving in the amount of \$3,647. The change involves eliminating a driveway approach in Tierra Verde Phase 2, resulting in a deduction in the contract.

•Approved a change order with Duling Construction for changes to the lift station at the Sunflower Commerce Park in the amount of \$1,200.

•OK'd an agreement with the Greater Wichita YMCA to have it continue using space at the rec center for its Summer Day Camp Program.

•Approved an appropriations ordinance of \$770,332, which includes \$300,000 for special projects.

•Approved an agreement between the city and the city of Wichita concerning the reconstruction of the one-mile stretch of 37th North between Woodlawn and Oliver. The project is

set to take place in 2016 and increase the road from two lanes to three and add curb and guttering.

The well-used section of road is currently in rough shape and does not allow passing or, if traffic is heavy, quick left turns. The project will be overseen by the Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization.

•Heard City Manager Ty Lasher report that Bel Aire would have a booth at the annual home show Feb. 5 through 8 at Century II in Wichita and is seeking volunteers who wish to help out for a shift of a few hours. Contact Lasher at 744-2451 or tlasher@belaireks.gov for more information.

•City offices will be close Jan. 19 for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

All five council members were present at the Jan. 6 meeting. The next council gathering is a workshop set for 6:30 p.m. Jan. 13. Topics include marketing of Central Park, changes to the fee structure and marketing incentives on new homes.

Participants then place grocery orders a couple of days in advance of their

delivery day. All items are purchased at Dillons the day of delivery. Participants pay for the items when they are delivered.

"I couldn't live by myself without it," said Wichitan Lola Squires, who has been

using the Roving Pantry for about two years. "I don't have anybody to go buy groceries. ... They get stamps and just anything Dillons sells. I really appreciate it."

Hamilton said program workers try hard to get ex-

actly what participants order each time.

"I was homebound and I had to rely on other folks to do for me," he said. "I kind of understand both sides of this. I know it can be really difficult having somebody

shop for you. ... If they give us a try, we'll do everything we can for them to make it work."

Smith said participants are welcome to use the program for as long as they need to or even intermittently.

made of Kansas limestone and then set in concrete. "A lot of planning has gone into this," Lasher said.

Work on the project should begin soon and be done in the next couple of months.

Rupe, a Kansas stone sculptor who also owns a quarry on his property, had the lowest of four bids received by the city. He also has experience with these types of signs along the Kansas Turnpike.

Lasher said Rupe is excited about the project and is hoping this first one leads to more work with the city. It could, as city officials want to place up to eight of the large works at the city's entrance points.

One of the challenges the city has is that there is no delineation point as people

enter Bel Aire, and since there is development to the city limits of both Bel Aire and Wichita, there's no way for motorists, especially visitors, to realize they're in Bel Aire.

"These signs will help us create a sense of community," Lasher said.

Lasher is looking to get the chamber of commerce and businesses to help sponsor the signs.

In other action, the council:

•Adopted revised new home incentives. The incentives are based on providing property tax relief on a five-year sliding scale. The purchaser of a new home within the city limits would get 75 percent off a city property tax bill for the first two years, 50 percent off for the third and fourth years, and 30 percent off for the fifth year. That works out to \$2,940 for someone purchasing a \$200,000 house. There were 60 new home sales in the city last year and most buyers,

or a bit more than 50, took advantage of the incentives, Lasher said. The offer doesn't apply to rental properties. The incentives help Bel Aire bring in new buyers and assist it with offsetting their property taxes, Lasher said. Mayor David Austin concurred.

"We want the city to remain competitive," he said.

•Approved an amendment of the city's comprehensive plan. Discussion of the long-range planning framework had taken part at an

earlier gathering, so the vote was a formality and did not spur any discussion.

•Passed a second addendum to a real estate purchase agreement with Shaheen Real Estate LLC and authorized the mayor to sign it.

The purchase involves 80 acres of city property at a price of \$9,000 an acre. The land is zoned agricultural, but could be used for possible future development.

All five council members were present at the Jan. 20 meeting.

## Man sentenced in porn distribution

A Park City man was sentenced Jan. 21 to nearly 14 years in federal prison for distributing child pornography to young boys over the Internet, U.S. Attorney Barry Grissom said.

Kyle B. Rains, 31, pleaded guilty to one count of distributing child pornography. In his plea, he admitted that the investigation began after Feb. 6, 2014, when Omegle, an Oregon-based Internet video chat service detected child pornography videos being streamed from Rains' IP address. Omegle notified the CyberTipline of the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, which forwarded the information to the Kansas Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. Investigators followed an electronic trail to Rains' residence in Park City.

Investigators determined that Rains was broadcasting a video of a toddler being raped and sodomized. He was able to use the Omegle service to select recipients to receive the videos. He targeted young boys.

Rains was sentenced to 165 months in prison.

## Woman pleads to copper theft

A third person who tried to steal copper wire from a rural Westar substation last winter pleaded guilty to felony attempted theft Jan. 5 in Sedgwick County District Court. Kristie Parsons, 24, of Moore, Okla., will be sentenced Feb. 19.

Prosecutors said that on Dec. 3, 2013, Parsons and two other Oklahoma residents were stopped by a Sedgwick County sheriff's deputy near the Westar substation in northeast Sedgwick County. The substation was targeted because the suspects used Google Earth to determine where large quantities of copper wire were stored, the sheriff's office said.

Timothy Weaver, 32, of Del City, Okla., received a sentence of nine months in prison. Dusty Drake, 33, of Oklahoma City received an 11-month sentence.
